

SAD ANNOUNCEMENT

Today we mourn the passing of an old friend, Common Sense.

Common Sense lived a long life, but died in the United States from heart failure early in the new millennium.

No one really knows how old he was, since his birth records were lost long ago in bureaucratic red tape. He selflessly devoted his life to service in schools, hospitals, homes, and factories, helping folks get jobs done without fanfare and foolishness.

When an individual, too stupid to realize a steaming cup of coffee was hot, was awarded a huge settlement, Common Sense threw in the towel.

As the end neared, Common Sense drifted in and out of logic but was kept informed of developments regarding questionable regulations such as those for low flow toilets, rocking chairs, stepladders and auto emissions.

Common Sense finally succumbed when, while the United States was fighting a war on terrorism, a federal judge declared the Pledge of Allegiance to be unconstitutional.

Common Sense was preceded in death by his parents, Truth and Trust; his wife, Discretion; his daughter, Responsibility; and his son, Reason.

Fate comes when it will. All you have to do is get ready.

I recently found this when cleaning out some files; originally, it was posted on a bulletin board where I worked back in the early 80's. I thought it was pretty much applicable to life whether a leader or not; and since patience is something I always have to work at, asked to copy it. Seems no one ever knew who wrote it; so, permission was granted to copy and share the inspiration.

Different people will draw inspiration from different parts of this saying – adjusting and applying to different events in their lives. When meeting someone new, hearing a new idea, especially when it means changing from the way "we always did it". Do we really listen to their points of view and try to understand our differences, or do we just try to figure how to change their minds to our way? We also need to remember that different people have different talents and ways to do things. I really believe that sometimes compromise is the answer; taking a little from each point of view, we can accomplish the goal of all. Patience is the path to compromise.
